Program Description		The Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) provides support to help families pay for child care based on meeting income or other eligibility requirements and utilizing a licensed or certified provider who participates in CCAP.		Head Start (HS) promotes school readiness of children up to age five from low-income families by enhancing their cognitive, social, and emotional development. HS programs provide a learning environment that supports growth in language, literacy, and social and emotional development. HS emphasizes the role of parents as their child's first and most important teacher. HS builds relationships with families that support family well-being.	State funded preschool is available for all four year old children whose family income is below 160% of the federal poverty level, and all three and four year old children with identified disabilities regardless of income. The program focuses on the child's physical, intellectual, and social and emotional development, including interpersonal, intrapersonal, and socialization skills.
